Results Analysis

Both papers in 2025 were very similar in result trends to last year. The spread of results continued to reflect our aim of a positive skew to encourage student sense of achievement. The papers also showed student improvement from grade 7 to 8 and grade 9 to 10.

Interestingly, the following trends where noticed:

- Yr 7 and 8 students found questions relating to archaeology easier, demonstrating an understanding of this content and historical dating. Both groups had a strong understanding of the terms used to measure time periods.
- Yr 7 and 8 students had difficulty with some of the historical knowledge questions and comprehension-based questions.
- Yr 7 had difficulty with drawing conclusions from maps and timelines, whilst Yr 8s demonstrated a greater skill in this as with use of historical terminology.
- However, by Yr 8 students tended to have a better grasp of terminology as well as maps and timelines thus reflecting positively the teaching of these skills.
- Overall Yr 9s and 10s demonstrated they had skills is understanding the message of sources, could identify an author's perspective and purpose.
- Both the Yr 9s and 10s had a good historical knowledge/ understanding of the Industrial Revolution period.
- Not surprisingly, the Yr 9s struggled more with historical terminology than the Yr 10s.

Moving forward, it could be valuable to look at your student's results to identify areas of strength and weakness, relating to the historical skills. An easy way to get a snapshot is to give your students their summaries, then get your students to put up their hands if they got a question right. Count how many got the question right, thus indicating areas for future teaching.
